Ships and aircraft that made the formation are the USS Nimitz (CVN 68), USS Makin Island (LHD 8), USS Chung-Hoon (DDG 93), USS Decatur (DDG 73), Landing Cushion Amphibious Craft, F-35B Lightning II, F-18 E/Fs Super Hornet, EA-18G Growler, MV-22 B Osprey, E-2C Hawkeye, MH-60S and MH-60R. The units are conducting combined expeditionary strike force operations, demonstrating unique high-end war fighting capability, maritime superiority, power projection and readiness.





Naval Station Everett celebrated Black History Month with the stories of sailors who have blazed the trail for future generations and recognized a group of dedicated sailors known as the "Golden Thirteen." The Golden Thirteen *(above)* was comprised of Jesse Walter Arbor, Phillip G. Barnes, Samuel Edward Barnes, Dalton L. Baugh, Sr., George Clinton Cooper, Reginald E. Goodwin, James E. Hair, Charles Byrd Lear, Graham E. Martin, Dennis Denmark Nelson, John W. Reagan, Frank E. Sublett, Jr. and William Sylvester White. In January 1944, there were nearly 100,000 black sailors in the U.S. Navy, but none were officers. That changed when a group of sixteen black enlisted men were assembled at Recruit Training Center, Great Lakes, IL for officer training that month. The odds were initially stacked against them as there was still a strong sentiment within the Navy that African Americans could not succeed as officers. The normal officer training course was 16 weeks, however, these men were expected to complete it in eight -a move that they believed was an attempt to set them up for failure. The Navy also expected a 25% attrition rate, similar to that of white officer candidates. However, the group of 16 were determined not to fail, and supported one another throughout the brutal pace of the training. Though lights out was at 2230 each night, the group placed blankets over windows and studied together by flashlight, each man bringing his expertise to help strengthen the skills and knowledge of the others. At course end, all 16 passed their exams with marks so outstanding that some in Washington were certain that the men had cheated. The group was forced to retake certain exams, scoring even higher, with an average grade of 3.89 out of 4-the highest average of any class in Navy history at the time. Despite all 16 had passed the course, the Navy still wished to only commission 12, or 75%, as officers. Twelve were selected, and a thirteenth was made a chief warrant officer, hence the nickname "The Golden Thirteen."

Snohomish High School's Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (MCJROTC program has been recognized as a Naval Honor School for the 2021-22 school year earning Naval Honor School distinction in September 2022. Selection for the Naval Honor School means the school's MCJROTC program was in the top 20% of the 268 programs in the United States.

Lucky 13! Patriot Company Wins 13th **Consecutive Regular Season Drill Meet**

On Saturday, 11 February 2023, Patriot Company traveled to Graham Kapowsin High School for the third drill meet of the 2022-23 school year. Seven JROTC schools were in attendance. Including the host school, they included: Federal Way (Air Force JROTC), Todd Beamer (Air Force JROTC), Auburn Mountain View (Army JROTC), Bremerton (Navy JROTC), Spanaway Lake (Navy JROTC) and Steilacoom High School (Army JROTC) who competed in their first ever, JROTC drill competition!. Patriot Company secured their thirteenth consecutive regular season drill meet victory by bringing home first place awards in seven of the eight competitive categories and nine total team awards. The highlight of the day was the head to head competition between Liberty's and Graham Kapowsin's physical fitness teams. With each team earing a victory in the first



two drill meets; the motivation and level of effort was at an all-time high to see which team would come out on top in this head to head competition. While Graham Kapowsin had two of their competitors achieve the maximum number allowed (120), all five members of Liberty's team scored at

least 100 points and as a result. Liberty had a narrow lead after the first event. The second event, sit-ups, was fairly close so Patriot Company had a narrow lead going into the mile run. Prior to the run, one of the judges made each competitor state their goal and four of liberty's five cadets stated their goal was to beat the current fastest time of the day and Graham Kapowsin cadets stated similar goals. THE RACE WAS ON! After one lap Ashton Rood was in the

lead and Fischer Skroch was in third, with a GK runner right in the middle. That is where the competition ended. Liberty male and female runners finished first and second in their respective categories and as a result, Liberty's Physical Fitness Team A won the competition by over 300 total points. Patriot Company will try to make it 14 in a row, on Saturday, 4 March at Liberty High School.
