tinued support of our dedicated sea service members and their families. RADM Fosse is a longtime fan of the Navy League with his last close connection with the San Francisco Bay area councils. At his Training Center Petaluma command assignment, Sea Cadets were hosted on base many weekends for ceremonies, drills and activities. RADM Fosse briefly covered USCG missions in the Pacific Northwest served by 3,000 active duty, reserve, civilian, and auxiliary women and men in the district comprised by Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and Montana. These states are home to three air stations, two Sectors, 17 cutters, four Aids to Navigation Teams, and 15 small boat stations including Coast Guard Surf Stations. District 13 is also home to several specialized Units including the National Motor Lifeboat School, the Advanced Rescue Swimmer and Advanced Helicopter Rescue School, as well as a Marine Force Protection Unit that is located on Naval Base Kitsap where it directly supports the Navy and its National Security mission. Waterborne cargo and associated activities contribute to more than 68,000 jobs for the state of Oregon, over half a million jobs in the state of Washington, and annually generates more than \$250 billion dollars for the two states. Within Puget Sound alone, District 13 ensures safe passage for the nation's largest ferry system, transporting 25 million ferry passengers a year and also facilitate

vital commerce links in Puget Sound, the Salish Sea, and the Straits. Internationally the CG works closely with our Canadian counterparts in the region. Specifically, a joint vessel ship rider program was implemented whereby members of the Coast Guard, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and Canadian Coast Guard ride on each other's ships to expand law enforcement capabilities over the 125-mile maritime border. District 13 works closely with Canadian Vessel Traffic System to safely move thousands of vessels every year in and out of the Strait of Juan de Fuca and to the

"Not only am I excited about the great things our Coast Guard members are doing currently, but I am also excited as we look ahead to the future, especially here in the Pacific Northwest." The expansion of USCG Base Seattle will allow Seattle to become the focal point in the United States' strategy to increase Arctic presence in a rapidly changing environment. will be homeport for two new future Fast Response Cutters. With these new assets comes a potential for a new Base construct in Astoria to help support an increase in personnel and operations in NW Oregon. "I mentioned that these are exciting times for the Coast Guard, but they are also challenging times in terms of our workforce. I think it's no secret to you that attracting citizens to military service in our country is at a historically challenging state." Recruiting is being called an "existential" crisis for the Coast Guard, and retention of currently serving members is close to that. Bottom line, the CG is hiring and indeed is looking for motivated women and men who want to learn valuable skills, serve their nation, and be members of an organization that dates to 1790 and is persistently and proudly serving in communities across the United States and beyond. "As much as we're looking to recruit the next generation of military members, we're here tonight to recognize those who are serving today, and not just serving, but serving with excellence. In summary they are the best of the best, leaders of character, devoted to duty, an example for all of us, and plain awesome. They are our best recruiting poster, the things they do and



the way they serve as brand ambassadors for their respective services is inspiring." RADM Fosse concluded by asking any family members, also heroes who are integral to our military safeguarding the interests of our country, to stand up for just a moment. Karmin then presented RADM Fosse (above) with a framed Betty Vestuto painting of the

recently (1 February 2024) decommissioned 210 foot USCGC Steadfast (WMEC 623) with a CG helicopter on deck. Betty Vestuto, known as "The Chart Artist," hand paints all her original paintings on authentic N.O.A.A. charts. Next, CAPT Joshua Menzel, Commanding Officer Naval Station Everett also thanked the Navy League for not only sailor recognitions but also for the legislative support that leads directly to protecting the US Navy. CAPT Menzel also made a pitch for recruiting for the best Navy in the world. He further stated the reason the US Navy was "The Best" was not just technological or nuclear advantages - not even leadership - but the navy sailors who are so resilient. He said everyone has experienced engineering casualties many miles from port and he has personally observed a crewmember wiping grease from his hands and saying, "It's fixed,



Cap." When asked how, the crewman said, "Don't ask that, Cap." Karmin then presented CAPT Menzel (above) with a flask engraved with the Navy Emblem. 

#### **Everett Division Sea Cadet News**

The Puget Sound Training Contingent Sea Cadets hosted a week-long training evolution at Fort Worden state park 26 December 26 - 1 January for 153 Sea Cadets and adult leaders from across the United States. The cadets trained in seven different training classes: Recruit Training, Petty Officer Leadership Academy, Advance Leadership and Strategy, US Navy Honors and Ceremonies, Navy League Orientation, Basic Aviation and Basic Medical. Cadets slept in the barracks; marched on the parade ground and mustered every



day for morning and evening colors. Each cadet struggled mentally, emotionally, and physically, learning new skills and technical knowledge while honing their military bearing and their character. Throughout the week, cadets were given the opportunity to visit and tour the USCGC Osprey (WPB 87307) (at right) home ported in Port Townsend, WA. The cadets interacted with the crew and learned about the missions, propulsion, and most importantly, the galley. Naval Station Everett Division's Chief Petty Officer Jameson



Grimsby was selected as the Command Chief Petty Officer for the entire contingent ensuring cadet safety, providing technical support to all the different training classes to ensure all cadets learned as much as possible all while keeping in the



spirit of the US Navy and Coast Guard. The weeklong training culminated with a spirited graduation ceremony attended by about 400 people including parents, siblings, extended families and



friends. Outstanding cadets were honored with awards and ribbons and returned home with their families or transported to Sea-Tac airport for flights home. The cadets were all exhausted



from the long days and evenings by rising early, physical fitness routines, classroom learning, field learning and team training.
